

Thank you for joining us today for our 11th Annual BROADWAY BARKS! We are thrilled that BROADWAY BARKS continues to be such a popular and joyous event, and are proud to have your support and enthusiasm.

Because of our cause, we have helped to lower the authanasia list here in New York steadily over these past II years. More and more pets are being adopted from shelters and rescue groups in our area, because of your support of our mission. Shelter adoption remains a passionate priority for BROADWAY BARKS!, but the pet overpopulation crisis can't be remedied by adoption alone. The number one way to prevent overpopulation and save animals' lives is by spaying and neutering.

We're doing our part to make New York City a more humane place for animals. Through our collaborative efforts, of which BROADWAY BARKS is a part, we're moving steadily toward our goal of ensuring that every healthy and treatable dog and cat in New York City has a home. In 2002, the rate of euthanasia among shelter animals was at 74% of the total intake. Last year, the number of animals cuthanized in NYC shelters has dropped to 39% of the total intake. In just the last few years, 15,000 fewer animals

Both of our lives have been touched by the animals we've adopted through rescue groups and shelters, and we know the same is true for you. Unlike many people who look to breeders and pet shops for "the perfectly bred pet," we understand to bypass shelters is to dismiss perfectly loving and lovable companion pets like the ones we will meet today. Without our love, concern, and compassion these animals face an uncertain future.

- Neutering cats makes them less likely to spray and mark territory.

- Unsterilized animals often exhibit more behavior and temperament problems than do those who have been spayed or neutered.

Manhattan Valley Cat Rescue is a 501c3 group formed by neighborhood volunteers who united to ease the plight of abandoned cats and kittens living on the streets of Manhattan Valley (100 Street to 110 Street, between Amsterdam Avenue and Central Park West). This is an area which has undergone much gentrification, and with that, many of the poorer residents have been forced out, some leaving their cats behind. This has also resulted in many of the vacant lots and abandoned buildings disappearing, places that stray cats called home. As options for these cats shrink, so do their chances of surviving on the streets, and it is with this in mind that we are dedicated to rescuing them. Beyond this we also work with neighborhood stores, to convince them to neuter and properly care for their store cats. In over 10 years of rescue work we have saved almost 500 cats from the streets of our neighborhood. Through the use of a small network of foster homes and donated space we are currently caring for over 60 cats. Many of these have not been able to get adopted due to health or behavioral problems and since we are strictly no kill, we are committed to caring for these cats, regardless of their adoptability. We pledge to keep them safe, happy and healthy. All our rescues are fully vetted, neutered, and fed only top quality healthy diets. Our long term goal is to acquire land to set up a spacious sanctuary for our rescues, so that they can live out their lives in safety and comfort.




